

GLOBAL PROGRAMS & PARTNERSHIPS

A RECAP OF OUR YEAR:

The 2021-2022 academic year saw the world opening up—incrementally—and presented new opportunities as well as challenges for Marshall's Global Programs and Partnerships (GPP) team. Despite the uncertainty, we provided both undergraduate and graduate students courses and programs with an international focus.

In congruence with last year, we offered on-campus international experiential learning courses to students. PM GLOBE provided MBA.PM students the chance to develop solutions to real business problems faced by small companies based in Latin America and Canada. Similarly, undergraduate students enrolled in the LInC, TIE, GLP, and GSI courses enjoyed interacting with a variety of global companies, helping them resolve specific business obstacles.

Since Spring 2020, we experienced firsthand how the pandemic changed the global landscape. After much discussion, USC determined semester-long exchange programs could proceed in Fall 2021 and Spring 2022. Following this decision, four Marshall MBA students participated in MBA International Exchange Programs (MBA IEP) and Marshall hosted an MBA exchange student in Spring 2022.

Because the COVID-19 situation improved both within the US and globally, the university reinstituted short-term international programs during the Maymester period after Commencement. We were thrilled at the prospect of being able to resume our programs with a travel component.

Before we could go all in and commit to getting students on planes once again, we conducted robust risk assessments to determine which locations were relatively safe, logistically feasible, and also a valuable learning experience for students. We are proud of the risk assessment process we have developed and understand that such efforts will continue to be critical to participants' safety and the overall experience of GPP's programs.

MARSHALL STUDENTS

In a joint effort with each program office, we launched four undergraduate Maymester co-curricular programs with travel components. For graduate students, we also supported course trips for EMBA and Global Supply Chain Management students.

This participant total includes these programs with travel components as well as the on-campus courses.

ON-CAMPUS INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING COURSES

These three programs—Learning About International Commerce (LInC), Global Social Impact (GSI), and Transfer International Experience (TIE)—are designed for students to focus on developing a global mindset through hands-on experiential learning. The courses consist of class sessions in which students explore major themes related to international business and the business environment of Latin America. The students collaborated with companies on projects that spanned a variety of industries across Central and South America.

STUDENT ENROLLMENT

The LInC, GSI, and TIE programs generate a learning environment for students to understand how culture affects doing business in a foreign country while also allowing students to explore their own cultural influences in the classroom. With all sections combined, there were 25 nationalities represented, and of the 184 students enrolled, 104 identified as females and 80 identified as males.

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMS

INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENTIAL CORPORATE LEARNING

EXCEL'S COMEBACK

In close collaboration with the Undergraduate International Programs Office, Marshall offered LInC, GSI, and TIE students who enrolled in Spring 2020, 2021, and 2022 the opportunity to participate in the ExCEL program. In May 2022, students engaged in one of three co-curricular ExCEL trips to London, Madrid, or Rome.

Students explored international cities and found value in the various company visits they were exposed to during the week. Below are some highlights.

ExCEL LONDON

For students in this group, PWC was the standout visit as the company's presentation shattered the preconception of being a tax consulting firm and focused more on emerging technology in the business world. The visit gave insight into how technology and Al are changing the ways businesses are operating and how there will be endless possibilities in the future for businesses to utilize technology for solutions.



ExCEL MADRID

This group spent the week unraveling the themes of diversity, sustainability, finance, and consumerism as they explored the city in an observational exercise and gained insights in a variety of company visits. Touring the Atletico Madrid Football Club was a highlight as students enjoyed exclusive access to parts of the stadium and information on how Atletico operates as a business.



EXCEL ROME

Students here favored their visit to Casale del Giglio vineyard and LUISS EnLabs, a university startup accelerator. Perhaps because many had not toured a vineyard before, this visit gave them a glimpse of business in a cultural setting. At LUISS EnLabs, they had the opportunity to meet with local students and share commonalities in their business academic endeavors.

In addition to a year-long course, the co-curricular Global Leadership Program (GLP) was offered to GLP students enrolled in the course in 2020, 2021, and 2022.

In May, GLP students traveled to Bangkok, Thailand, applying the learnings from the on-campus course. The focus in the semester class contained deep insights into the opportunities and challenges faced by global business professionals in leading and managing business enterprises in a global environment.

Students visited a wide range of businesses from international companies, family-owned companies, and startups to explore these curiosities firsthand.

PM GLOBE

PROJECT-BASED LEARNING

For this program, which typically travels in March, we had to capture the essence students would experience in this course even though a trip was not feasible early in the Spring Semester.

PM GLOBE focused on emerging trends in globalization and the impact on the future of jobs, society, and the structure of supply chains. This course aimed to apply the material students learned in their core classes to analyze an international business problem.

MBA INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE PROGRAMS



We also welcomed one International Student Fellow in the 2022 Spring Semester from University of St. Gallen.

This upcoming Fall Semester will offer even more study abroad opportunities as six students will relocate to the following university partners: University of St. Gallen, HEC Paris in France, KAIST College of Business in South Korea, and Sasin School of Management Graduate Institute of Business in Thailand.
